## CPR Training can teach people, save lives

Firefighters have to take many classes to save lives.

Some members of our department are now certified CPR instructors and will be offering CPR classes to help the

community. Shawnesey Cahill, one of the instructors, comments.

“It is very essential for not only the health care providers, but for everyone in the community to know basic life sup-

port,” she said. “Without oxygen to the brain, you go brain dead within six minutes, so if you can initiate CPR while calling 911, the chances of survival are greatly increased.”
